





Historic 24th Street Family of Parishes



Martyrs killed for the Catholic faith

Today we commemorate Jesuits who were killed for the Catholic Faith in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, after the Reformation. John Ogilvie, died 1615, ministered clandestinely to persecuted Catholics in Scotland. Stephen Pongrácz from Hungary, Melchior Grodziecki from Poland, and Mark Križevci, a local diocesan priest, ministered to the abandoned Catholics in Košice (Slovakia), and were martyred in 1619. Ignatius de Azevedo and 39 Jesuits he had recruited from Portugal for the Missions were massacred at sea in 1570 by French Calvinist pirates en route to Brazil. James Salès, a French Jesuit, ministered to straying Catholics in Aubenas, France, with his companion William Saultemouche, a Jesuit Brother. They were martyred in 1593.

Eyeglass Recycling

Many of you have used eyeglasses and sunglasses that you don't know where to recycle. Mary Lou Carlson is a member of the Omaha Sunrise Lions Club and picks up used glasses from optic shops. Lions Club has a large recycling program and glasses are processed and labeled with prescription strength, boxed, and sent to many poor areas in the world. For example, through this process, sunglasses have been sent to Creighton programs in the Dominican Republic and the Pine Ridge Reservation. To make it easy for you to recycle, a Lions eyeglass recycle box has been placed near the elevator on the main church level.

Adult Acolytes Formation Sessions

St. John's is seeking parishioners to serve the parish as adult Acolytes. Since Pope Francis opened the ministry of acolyte to women as well as men in 2021, the ministry of Liturgical Assistant at St. John's will now become that of Acolyte. Acolytes assist the presider at Mass in various ways including carrying the processional cross, holding ritual books, and assisting with the preparation of the altar. The formation and training for this ministry is a three-part series of lunch and-learns for prospective acolytes on the following dates:

- Sunday, February 18 from 12:00pm to 2:00pm

WISDOM ON THE WAY

This Sunday, we begin the first portion of Ordinary Time. Though the Gospel today is taken from John, we will hear mostly from Mark during Ordinary Time, as we are now in Year B.

Mark's is the briefest of the Gospels; it is also considered the most ancient by scholars. At the same time, Mark's Gospel lacks an infancy narrative (as does John's); it also has very little on the Resurrection. Brendan Byrne, SJ, in his "theological reading" of Mark, points out that "There is very little in Mark that is not repeated in Matthew and Luke..." In addition, "Mark also lacks content appearing in the other two [synoptic] gospels that has become distinctive of the Christian faith: The Beatitudes (Matthew 5: 3-12a; Luke 6: 20-23), The Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6: 9-13[Luke 11: 2-4), the parables of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10: 29-37), and the Lost Son (Luke 15: 11-32), the evocation of the great judgment (Matthew 25: 31-46)." On this point, Fr. Byrne notes, "Without these Christianity would surely be something else; without Mark, it might not have been very different at all..."

A shocking statement, at least to my mind. However, he continues by noting that "without Mark's likely 'invention' of the gospel genre we would probably not have the gospels of Matthew and Luke, to say nothing of John." Apart from the fact that it is included among the four canonical gospels, Fr. Byrne highlights other aspects of our current context for which Mark may offer particular light and insight.

Mark's telling of the stories "seem particularly attuned to address the darkness of unbelief and despair afflicting many human lives today." In addition, Mark exhibits "a readiness to confront absence and, in some sense, chaos, something that comes across to many people as a distinct gift." Fr. Byrne continues by pointing out that Mark's gospel, "...seems particularly designed to address failure in community leadership, and the wider disillusionment and hopelessness to which that failure can give rise."

Mark's gospel is rife with encounters with evil. Handling these appropriately—in reading, preaching and living the gospel—takes discernment and skill. "...the encounters with the demonic in Mark's gospel..." Fr. Byrne continues, "...challenge us to look at our own society...[and consider the] forces exercising a dehumanizing control over people's lives today." I can, at times, become fixated/focused on evil and the bad news of our world; the challenge is to confront these with Jesus and to allow him to gently call me and lead me to peace, light and freedom.

I look forward to walking the pilgrim path through Year B with the St. John's community. Mark will be our special guide, and, as always, Jesus will be our teacher and light.
