



# Anointing of the Sick at 5:00pm Mass on February 10 for World Day of the Sick

The weekend of February 10-11 is World Day of the Sick, an observation introduced by Pope John Paul II as a way for believers to offer prayers for those suffering from illnesses. The day coincides with the commemoration of Our Lady of Lourdes and is an important opportunity for those who serve in Catholic health ministry to reflect on caring for those who are sick as well as those who provide care to them. At St. John's we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick during the 5:00pm Mass on Saturday, February 10. Any baptized member of the Christian faithful in danger due to sickness or old age may receive the sacrament of anointing. Examples of individuals who may wish to receive the sacrament include:

- Those facing serious health challenges such as cancer or chronic illness.
- Elderly persons who are weakened, even though no notable illness is present.
- Those who face surgery due to serious illness.
- Those who suffer serious mental illness.

#### \*Why is there still a building fund collection?

The building fund addresses capital expenditures not accommodated by the regular operating budget.

- Rebuild two glass windows in resource room, completed in spring 2023, balance remaining \$5,270.00 -
- In this upcoming year and projected future projects:
  - \* 35,000 ear marked for an updating of the lighting system in the church to be done in 1-2 years.
  - \* Restoration of Holy Water fonts at the side entrances 1 \$1.500.00
  - \* Installation of donated Pieta Statue 23-24 \$6,000.00
  - \* Work in parish offices, installation of phone lines 23-24 waiting on cost
  - \* Painting of the interior of St. John's potentially 2025, in conversation with Creighton about this. 5 years ago estimated cost was \$350,000.00
  - \* Approximately 50 chairs in the church need repair, waiting on an estimate.
  - \* additional maintenance expenses.



#### Blessing of Candles on the Feast of the Presentation

On Friday, February 2 the Church celebrates the Feast of the Presentation of our Lord. Masses at St. John's will be celebrated at noon and 9:00pm. This event recalls Jesus' presentation in the Temple in Jerusalem forty days after his birth by his parents in obedience to the Law of Moses. It is customary on this day to bless candles, recalling Simeon's reference to the infant Jesus as the "light for revelation to the Gentiles" (Luke 2:32). You are most welcome to bring



your own candles to Mass to be blessed. Candles for home use will also available at the entrance of the church for a donation.

#### Blessing of Throats of the Feast of St. Blaise

The Memorial of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr is observed on Saturday, February 3. According to tradition, while Blaise was being arrested for being a Christian, a distraught mother, whose only child was choking on a fishbone, threw herself at his feet and implored his intercession. Touched at her grief, Blaise offered up his prayers, and the child was cured. Consequently, Saint Blaise is invoked for protection against injuries and illnesses of the throat. A special blessing of throats will be held after the 5:00pm Mass on Saturday, February 3.

#### **Adult Acolytes Formation Sessions**

St. John's is seeking parishioners to serve the parish as adult Acolytes. Since Pope Francis opened the ministry of acolyte to women as well as men in 2021, the ministry of Liturgical Assistant at St. John's will now become that of Acolyte. Acolytes assist the presider at Mass in various ways including carrying the processional cross, holding ritual books, and assisting with the preparation of the altar. The formation and training for this ministry is a three-part series of lunch and-learns for prospective acolytes on the following dates:

- Sunday, February 4 from 12:00pm to 2:00pm
- Sunday, February 11 from 12:00pm to 2:00pm
- Sunday, February 18 from 12:00pm to 2:00pm Formation sessions should be attended sequentially. Please register on the parish website so we can get an accurate count for food. Once a person has attended all three sessions, they will be scheduled to serve. Additional formation sessions will be held later in the spring. # WISDOM ON THE WAY

Every teacher has their own "thing" when it comes to writing. One of my teachers never allowed us to use absolutes (which, of course, is an absolute). Another teacher despised adverbs, believing they were redundant (who doesn't "yell loudly" or "quietly whisper"?). Personally, I cringe when my students qualify their thesis statements with "I believe" as in "I believe the Mongols were brilliant..." Today's gospel reminds me of my high school English teacher Mrs. Rempe's motto that: "punctuation matters."

Jesus' silencing of an unclean spirit leaves the people astonished, asking one another. "What is this?" The answer to which is not a hesitant guess made with shrugged shoulders, as in "a new teaching with authority?" It is a declarative statement of truth, punctuated with a period, not a question mark. It is "a new teaching with authority." Period. This authority is not derived from any human source but comes directly from Jesus' identity as the Son of God. The authority of Jesus is a clear sign of the Kingdom breaking into our world. It drives out darkness and brings liberation. This new teaching with authority is an active encounter with the Divine.

Today marks the beginning of Catholic Schools Week. During this week, we celebrate the critical role that Catholic education plays in nurturing young hearts that resonate with the Divine, fostering academic excellence, and forming individuals who are committed to serving others with compassion and justice. This year's theme, "Catholic Schools: United in Faith and Community" highlights the value of Catholic schools in our communities. In Catholic schools, classrooms are not just as repositories of knowledge but are sanctuaries where students encounter the Divine. Teachers are not only instructors, but also companions on each student's personal journey of spiritual growth. Students are not only learners, but beautiful instruments of God's transformative power in the world. Catholic schools empower students to recognize the authority of Jesus and respond with openness and generosity.

This week, let us pray with joy and gratitude for the gift of Catholic schools and that we embrace our call to discipleship and strive to be men and women for and with others who are committed to building God's Kingdom of justice, love, peace, mercy, and compassion. Let us pray for all Catholic school students, families, faculty, staff, administrators, and benefactors, that we, like the people of the synagogue, find ourselves astonished by the transformative power of faith and learning.
