St. John's is glad to welcome you and your community to celebrate your wedding liturgy!

Music enhances the beauty of the celebration and allows the gathered assembly to participate in the blessing through song. We know that many couples do not have experience in choosing and preparing music for a Catholic liturgy, and are here to support you as you lead your guests in prayer and celebration. "By a fruitful liturgical celebration of Marriage, ... it becomes clear that the spouses signify and participate in the mystery of the unity and fruitful love between Christ and the Church."

We ask that couples respect the Catholic faith tradition of our parish as they celebrate in St. John's beautiful worship space. As you plan, please remember that the music **should express the faith of the Church and the truth that all sacraments celebrate the Paschal Mystery of Christ.**² Music for the wedding liturgy in the Church draws hearts and minds into prayer, celebrates God's presence in the couple's relationship, and unites voices as one as the community participates in the celebration. This includes music for the processional and recessional moments. There is a wealth of instrumental and sacred music, from traditional to contemporary, including many songs from across all Christian traditions and languages.

"Secular music, even though it may emphasize the love of spouses for one another, is not appropriate for the Sacred Liturgy." Instrumental music can be appropriate, but iconic movie soundtracks and instrumental covers of secular songs tend to distract from the prayer of the liturgy. They are great for the wedding celebrations outside the liturgy, such as the rehearsal dinner or reception!

Each couple chooses their own singer(s) and instrumentalist(s). Selecting your musicians and or cantors should be done 6-9 months prior to your wedding date. A cantor (vocalist) should lead the assembly in the Responsorial Psalm, Gospel Acclamation, and other songs as applicable. (including the Glory to God, Holy, Memorial Acclamation, Amen, and Lamb of God if you choose the Rite of Matrimony within Mass). Each musician will have their own policies on planning with the couple and pricing. There you can also find music suggestions, references to our hymnals, an outline to help you plan the music for your liturgy, and templates of programs / worship guides to help your guests participate.

Couples may choose any music published by Oregon Catholic Press (OCP – Glory & Praise 3^{rd} Edition hymnals in St. John's and more), Gregorian Institute of America (GIA – Gather hymnals, We Celebrate hymnals, and more), or other sacred music publishers.

Contact mollymattingly@creighton.edu to include music graphics in your wedding program so your guests can participate, if songs are not in the *Glory & Praise 3rd Edition* hymnals and supplements in the pews. St. John's has a reprint license for the majority of OCP, GIA, and WLP songs. Molly can also tell you the song numbers for the St. John's hymnal supplement that will be in the pews on your wedding date.

Your musicians will have suggestions from their repertoire, too. Please keep in mind that musicians who play for non-Catholic wedding ceremonies may include suggestions that are not appropriate for Catholic liturgy (see the "Music Guidelines" page). Most sheet music is inexpensive and available for purchase through the publisher's website if your musicians need copies.

They are also appropriate to end the liturgy. <u>Catholic weddings should use a Gathering Hymn to begin worship together as the bride nears the altar.</u>

Sung Processionals / Recessionals

These pieces are appropriate for the entrance procession in the First Form of the Introductory Rites (family / generations, wedding party, priest, and couple in one procession like the beginning of a Sunday Mass). Hymn tunes are in all-caps. These tunes transition easily from being played instrumentally for part of a procession to being sung as a Gathering Hymn. They are also appropriate as a Gathering Hymn sung together in the Second Form. A sung hymn of praise is appropriate to end the liturgy as well. Any of these is also appropriate for other moments within the liturgy.
